## CT STATS: A PLAN TO GIVE MORE MONEY TO SCHOOLS


Some of the state's wealthiest school districts will see the largest percentage increases in state grants over the next five years under the budget proposed last month by Gov. M. Jodi Rell.

School districts across the state would get a significant boost in aid under the proposal. The Education Cost Sharing grant, the state's main source of education aid to cities and towns, would increase nearly 70 percent over the next five years.

Since a 1977 state Supreme Court ruling, school funding in Connecticut has been based on the principle of closing large funding disparities between wealthy and poor communities. The legislature introduced the ECS grant in 1989 but has imposed limits on the formula under the strain of tight state budgets, Rell's proposal would immediately lift spending caps that have limited state aid in some towns,

The most significant change in the governor's

plan is a substantial boost in the formula's foundation level from \$5,891 to \$9,687 per student in a five-year phase-in - the first major increase in more than a decade. The increase benefits virtually all school districts, but its biggest impact would be felt in the state's poorest towns.

A second factor is a change in the formula's guaranteed wealth level - a measure of wealth that helps determine the size of a town's grant The poorer the town, the larger the grant. The increase in the formula's wealth factor chiefly benefits towns of average wealth.

A third factor, called the minimum aid ratio, mainly benefits about 40 of the state's wealthiest communities, guaranteeing at least a minimum level of aid. Rell's plan would raise the minimum, which leads to a larger percentage increase for wealthy towns, even though they are receiving much less than the poor cities.
