



Town of Newington Workforce Profile

The Town of Newington is located 6 miles southwest of Hartford, has a land area of 13 square miles and is home to 30,031 residents.

Newington's population is comprised of 88% Whites, 2% Blacks, 4% Hispanics and 6% Other/Multi-Race individuals.







The town's median age is 44. The age distribution is demonstrated in the pie chart to the left.

Of Newington residents age 25+, 15% do not have a high school diploma, 49% possess a diploma or some college, and 36% have earned an Associate's degree or higher (State: 16%, 46%, and 38% respectively).

The 2003 cumulative dropout rate was 1.3% (down 2.1% from the previous year) and 89.3% of graduates pursue post-secondary education (up 6.5%).





Thirty-eight (38) percent of Newington's population 16 and over function at literacy levels one and two (out of five levels, level five being the highest). Individuals at levels one or two would not be able to read an ATM screen, decipher a bus schedule, read a newspaper, read the dosage on a medicine bottle, or fill out a job application.
