



Town of Rocky Hill Workforce Profile

The Town of Rocky Hill is located 7 miles south of Hartford and covers a land area of 13.9 square miles. It is home to 19,361 residents.

Rocky Hill's population is comprised of 86% Whites, 3% Blacks, 3% Hispanics, and 8% Other/Multi-Race individuals.







Rocky Hill's median age is 42. The age distribution is demonstrated in the pie chart to the left.

Of Rocky Hill residents age 25+, 10% do not have a high school diploma, 44% possess a diploma or some college, and 46% have earned an Associate's degree or higher (State: 16%, 46%, and 38% respectively).

The 2003 cumulative dropout rate was 2.6% (down 0.8% from the previous year) and 89% of graduates pursue post-secondary education (down 1.2%).





Thirty (30) percent of Rocky Hill's population 16 and over function at literacy levels one and two (out of five levels, level five being the highest). Individuals at levels one or two would <u>not</u> be able to read an ATM screen, decipher a bus schedule, read a newspaper, read the dosage on a medicine bottle, or fill out a job application.
